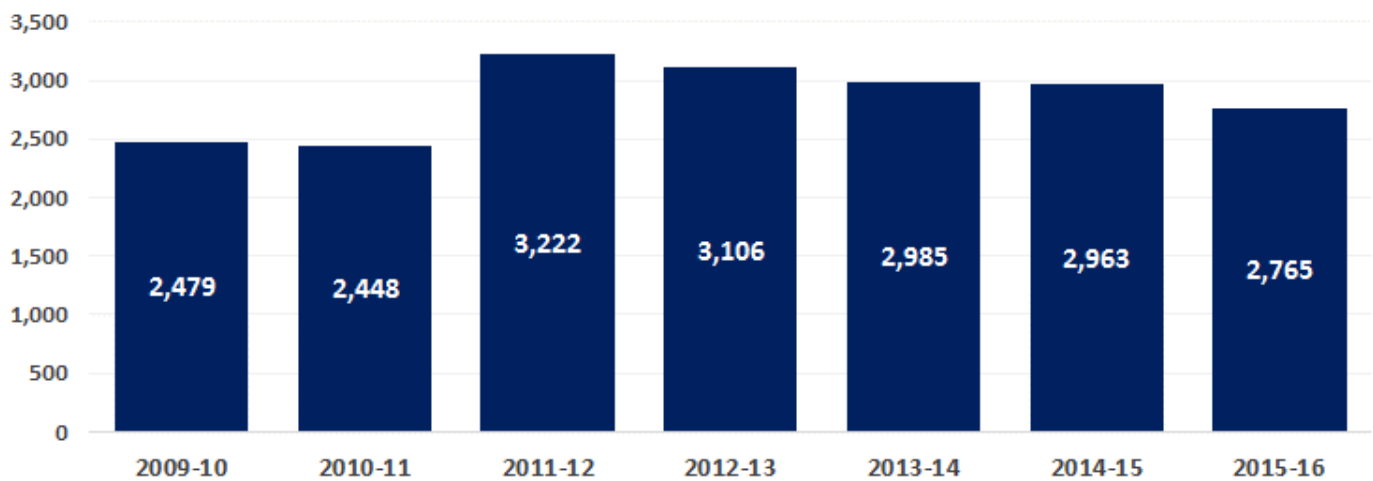
About the Institute

Domestic Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Students by Fiscal Year (April 1 to March 31)

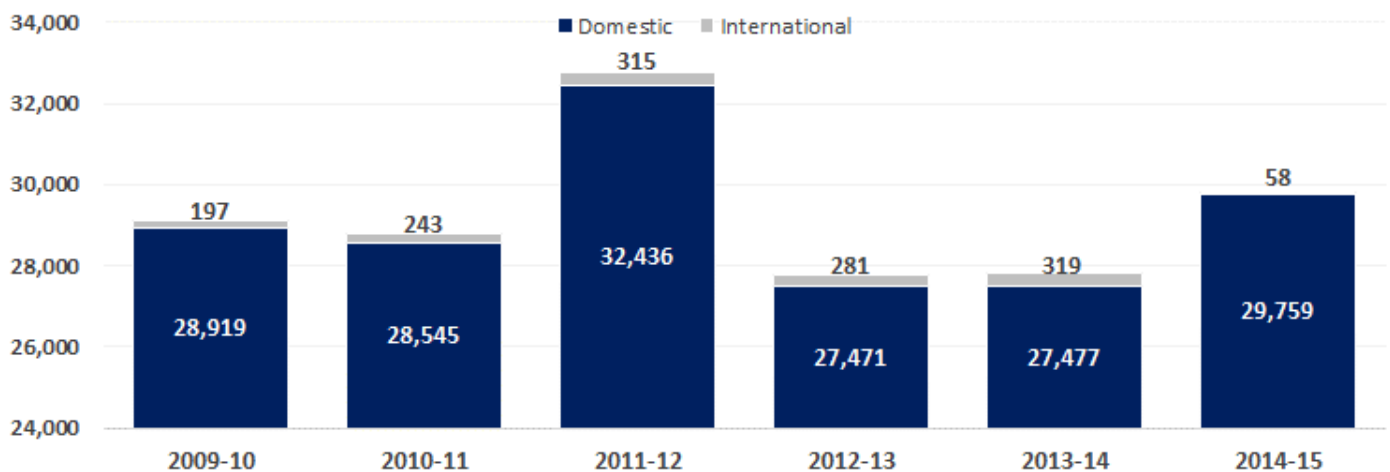
Student FTE is calculated by program where the equivalent of one full-time student equals one (1) FTE.

Headcount by Academic Year (September 1 to August 31)

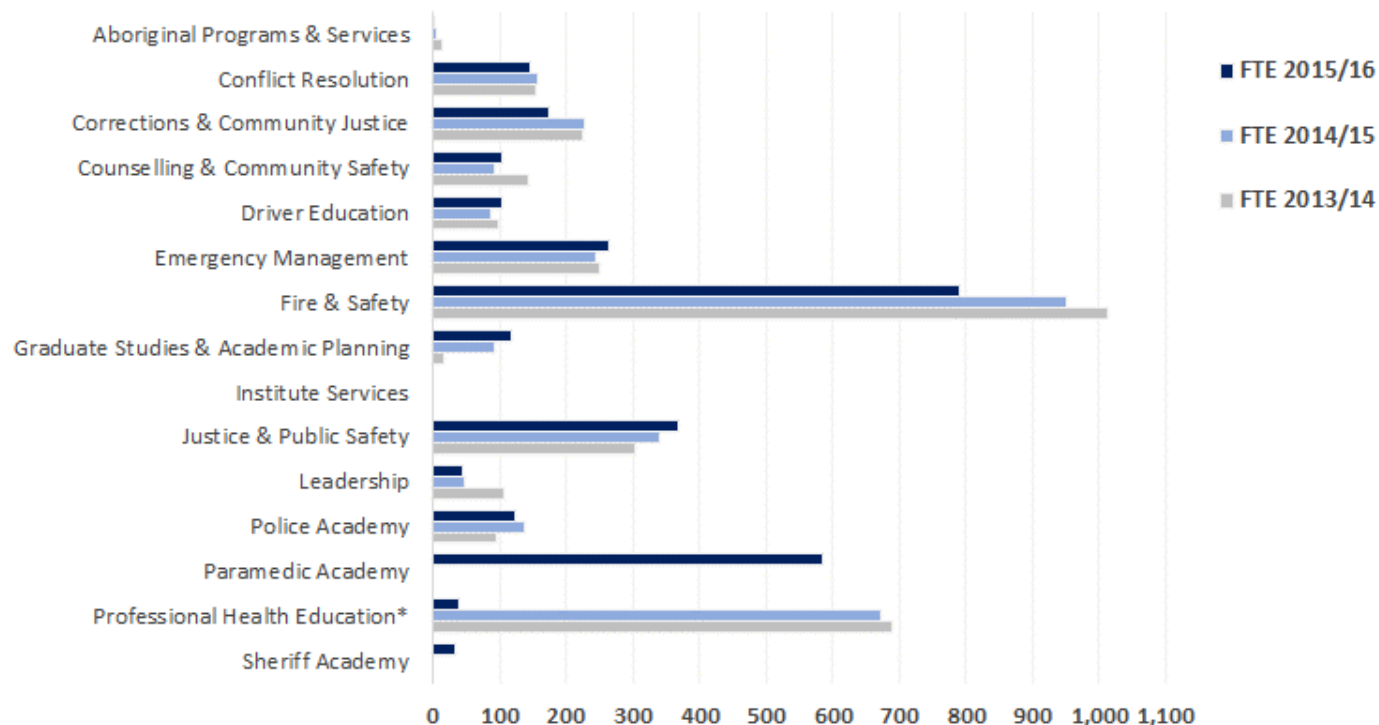
Headcount represents unique students enrolled at the JIBC.

Enrolment (FTE) by Division and Fiscal Year (April 1 to March 31)

Overall, 2015/16 FTE is similar to 2014/15 with small decreases in Fire & Safety and Health Sciences off-set by comparable increases in Justice & Public Safety and liberal studies courses. New this year is the separation of Paramedic Academy FTE from Professional Health Education.

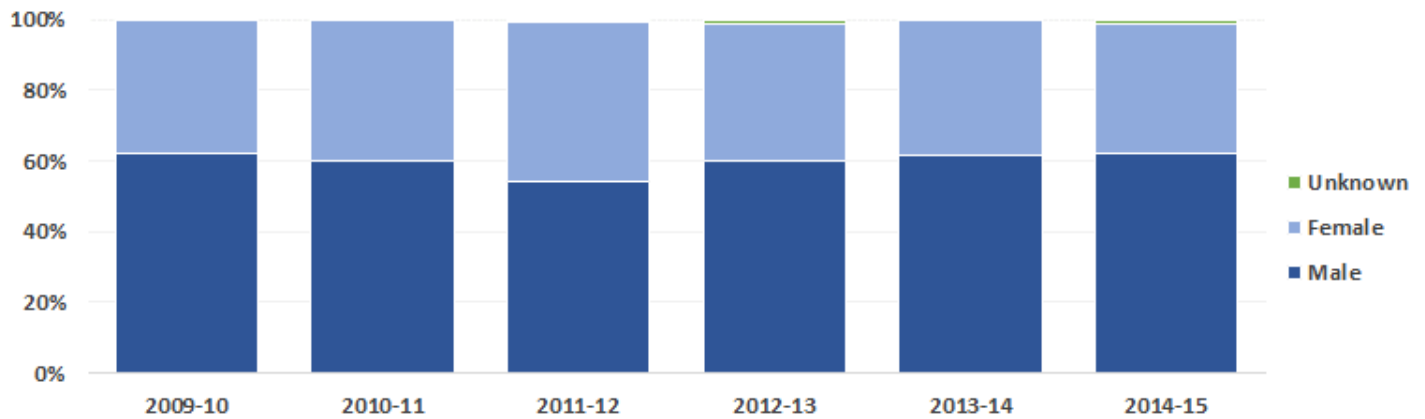

Gender by Academic Year (September 1 to August 31) – Domestic Students

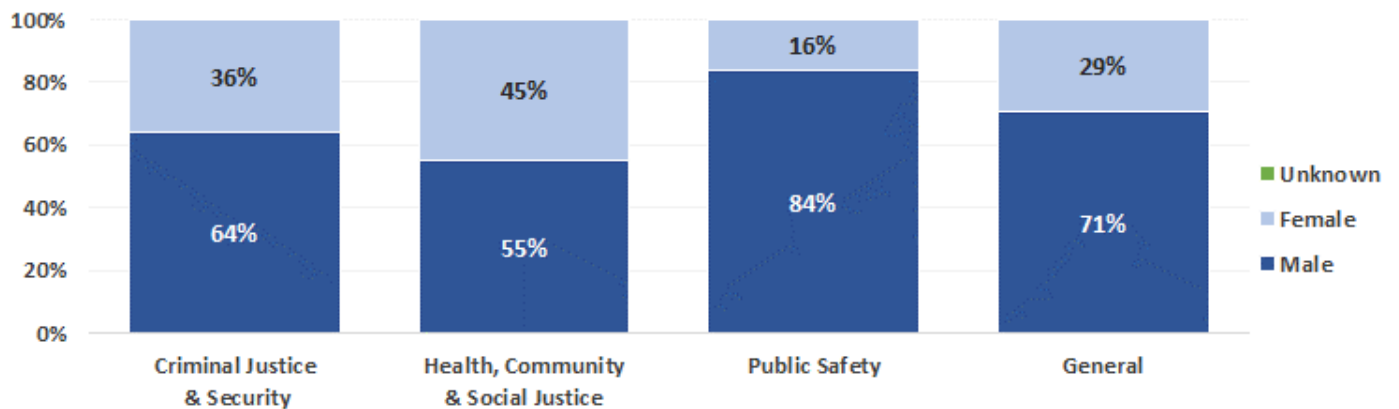
About 60% of domestic students at JIBC are male.

Gender Distribution by School by 2015/16 Fiscal Year (April 1 to March 31)

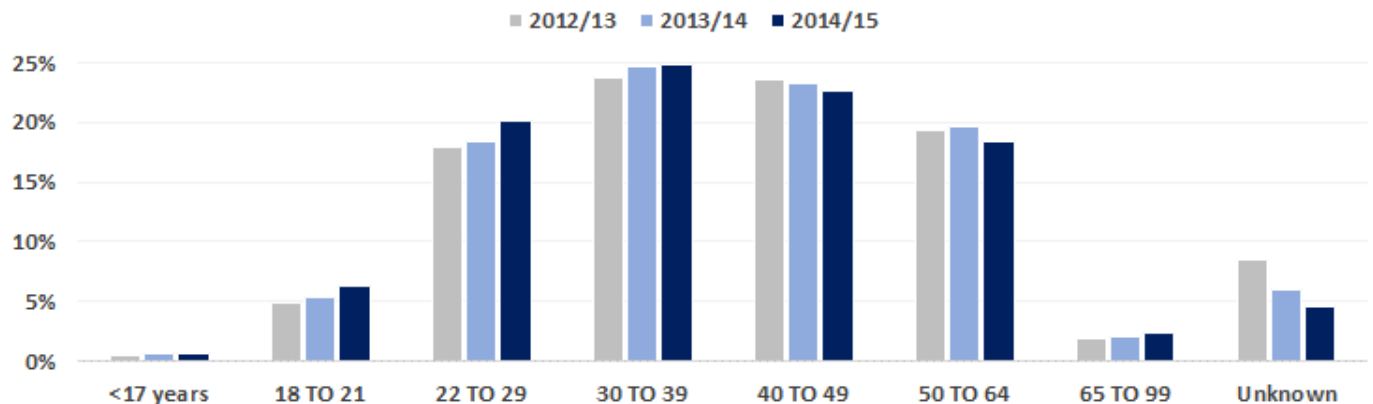
As is typical of post-secondary institutions, the gender distribution at JIBC varies by school, and is highly related to program and occupational destination.

Age Groupings by Academic Year (September 1 to August 31) – Domestic Students

At JIBC, about 69% of the students are aged 30 and above. Of note, there is a fairly equal distribution in the 22 to 29 (20%), 30 to 39 (25%), 40 to 49 (23%), and 50 and over (21%) age groups, with fewer students 21 and under (7%).

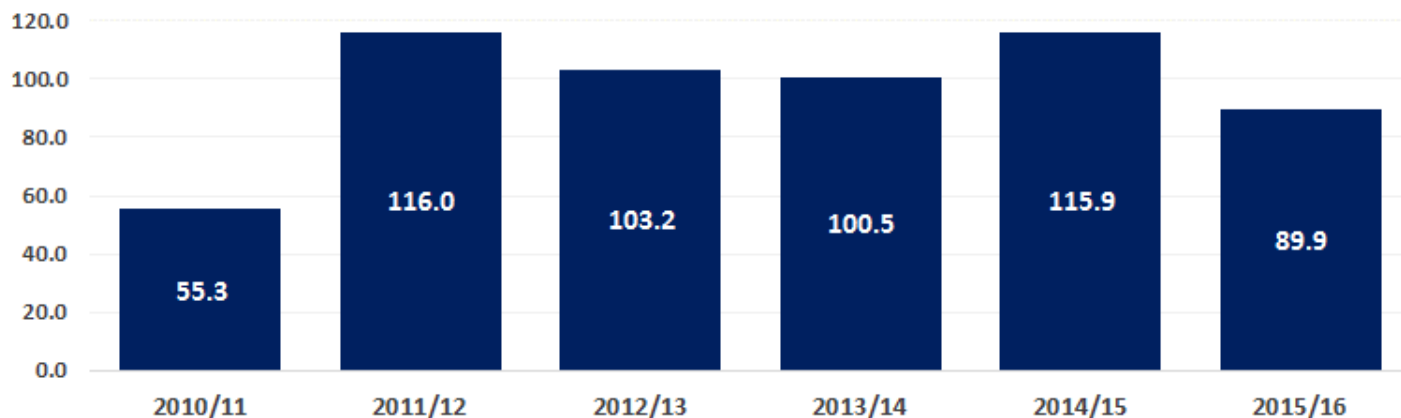

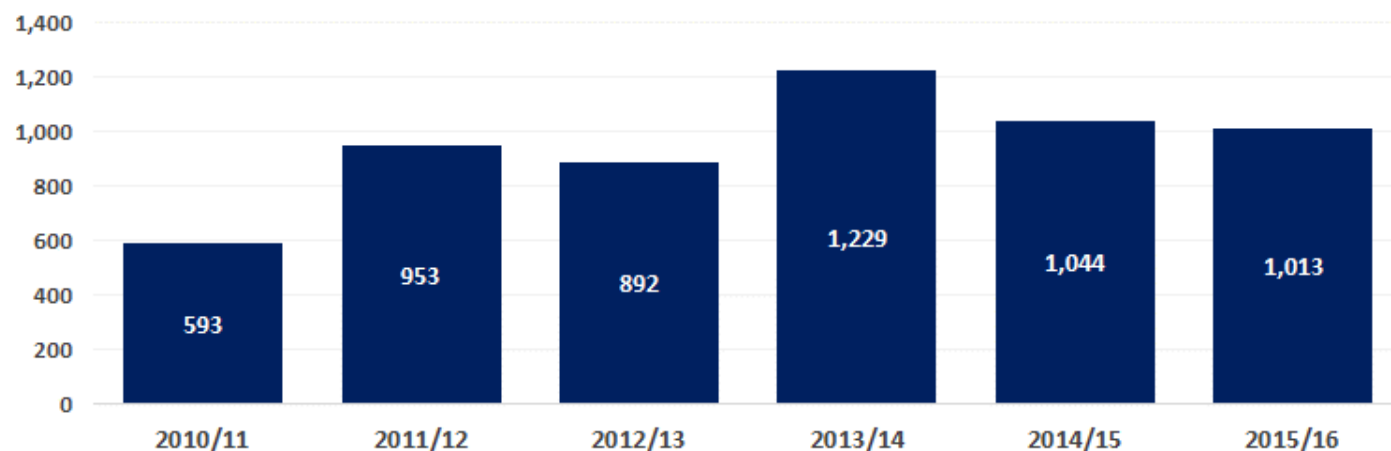
Aboriginal¹ Student FTE by Fiscal Year (April 1 to March 31)

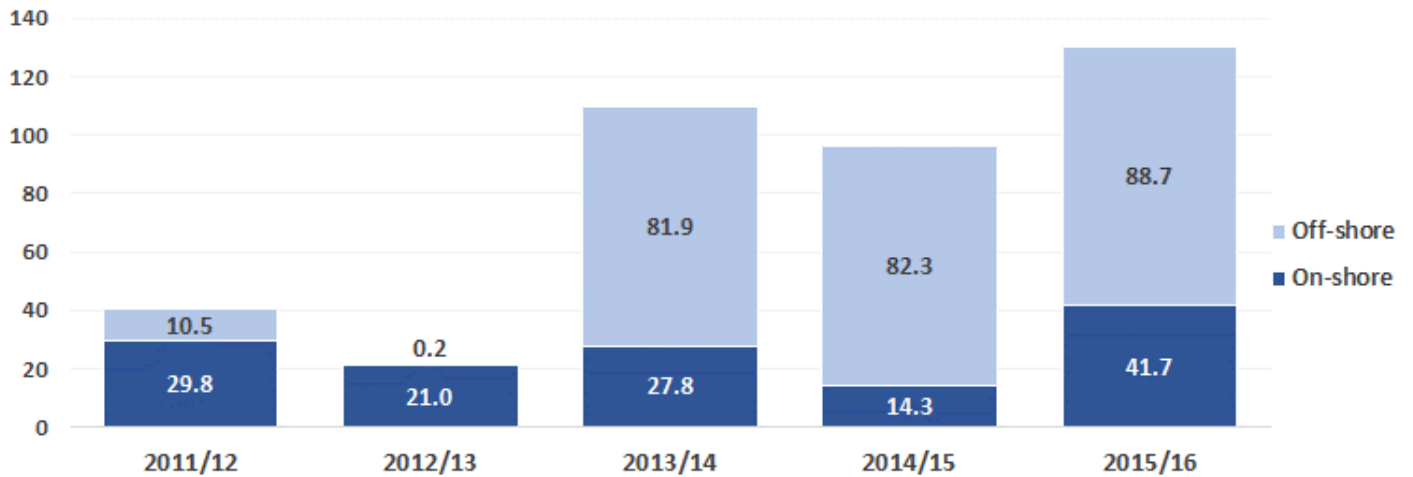

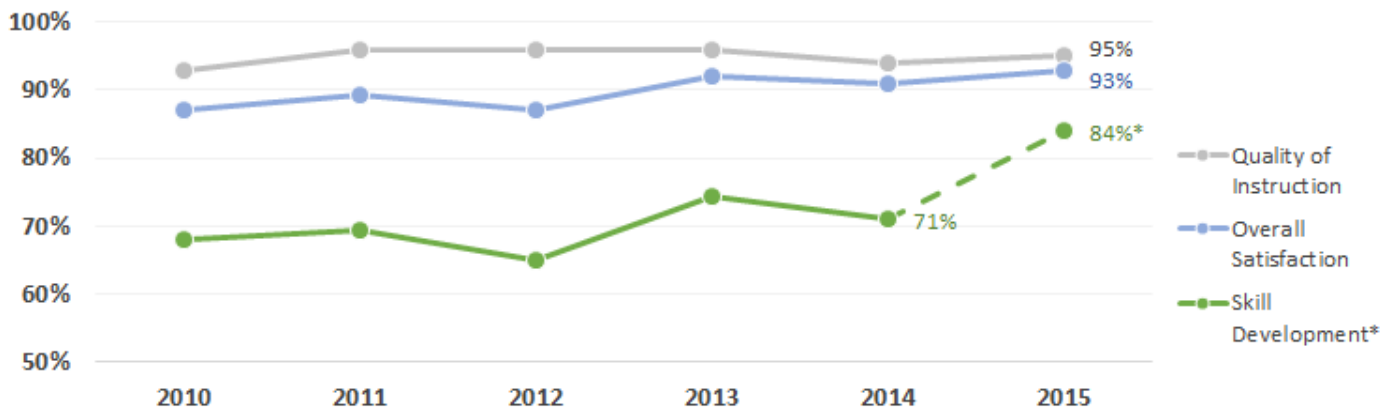

Student Outcomes

Certificate program graduates and diploma program graduates and near graduates are surveyed annually on their educational experience. The survey is conducted about one year after completing their program (meaning the 2015 data is reflective of the 2014 cohort).

Student Outcomes Results – 2010 to 2015

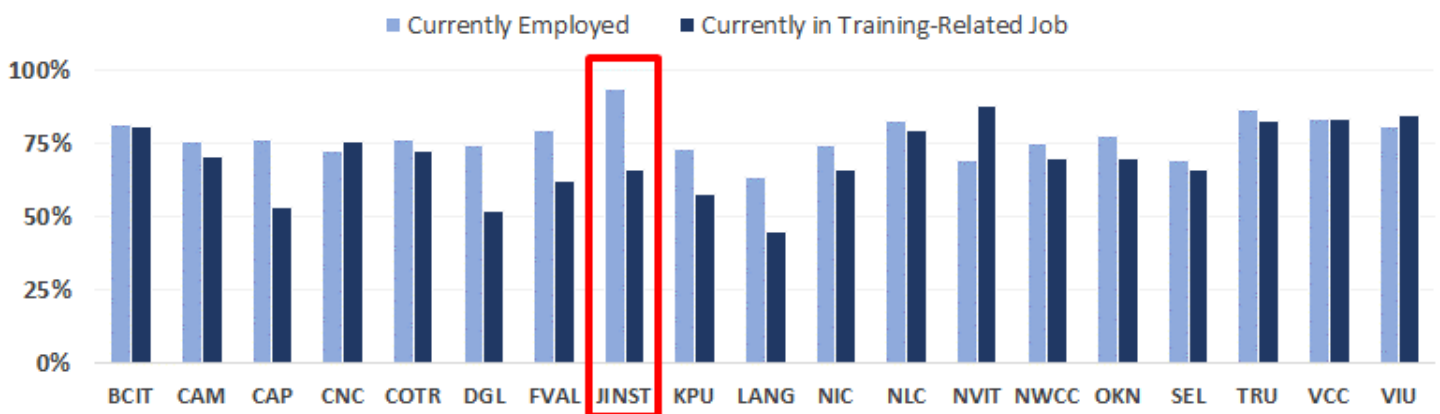

Employment Outcomes – 2015¹

The BC Student Outcomes Survey provides evidence of JIBC’s success in providing work-related training with 93% of those surveyed indicating they were in the workforce (highest in the province) and of those 93% who are in the workforce, 66% indicated they were in a training related job.

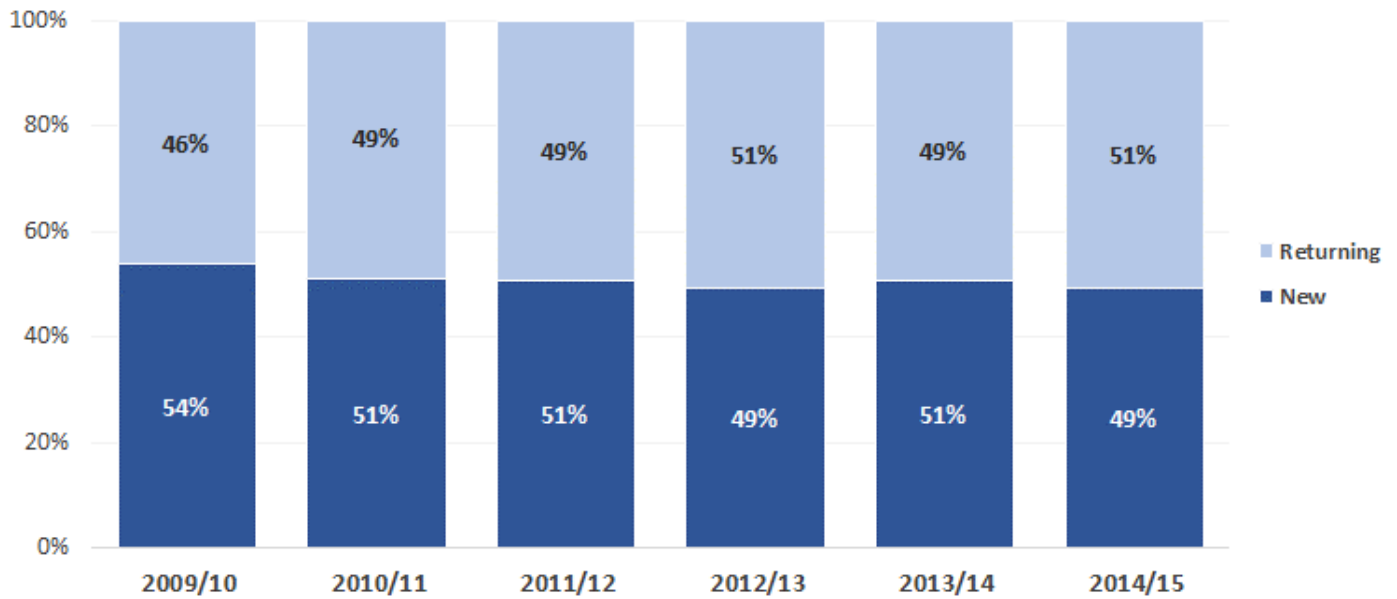

Returning Students
